(c) M. Sc. in Criminology and Criminal Justice (Research Methods)

With effect from 1 October 2006 (for first examination in 2007)

‘Criminology and Criminal Justice (Research Methods)

1. Every candidate must follow, for at least three terms, a course of instruction in Criminology and Criminal Justice (Research Methods).

2. There shall be a Board of Studies for the course, to be chaired by the Director of Graduate Studies for Criminology and also comprising all the members of the Board of Examiners for the Master of Science in Criminology and Criminal Justice (Research Methods) for the current year, the Director or Assistant Director of the Centre for Criminology and a student representative (the latter for open business only).

3. The course will consist of four components: two compulsory core courses in Explanation and understanding in criminology, and in Understanding criminal justice; four compulsory core research methods courses in Research design and data collection, Social explanation and data analysis, Statistical methods in the social sciences, and Qualitative research methods; two options; and a dissertation. The core courses will run throughout the first two terms (Michaelmas and Hilary). Options will run for six weeks in Trinity term. Candidates will be required to choose two options for the final term. The dissertation, which must not exceed 15,000 words and should not normally be less than 13,000 words, will be on a topic to be agreed by the Board of Studies. The required format for this dissertation is the common format prescribed for all law theses in paragraph six of the Special Regulations of the Board of the Faculty of Law for candidates admitted after Michaelmas Term 1997, which is printed in the Faculty of Law’s Graduate Students’ Handbook.

4. The options are listed in Schedule A below.

5. Not all options will necessarily be taught or examined in any one year. Details of those which are available will be published in the M. Sc. in Criminology and Criminal Justice (Research Methods) Coursebook produced by the Centre for Criminology for the year of the examination, subject to any amendment posted on the designated notice board in the Centre for Criminology by Monday of week minus 1 of the Michaelmas Term before the examination is held.

6. In addition to the options set out in Schedule A, candidates may offer any other option that may be approved from time to time by regulations published in the *Gazette* by the end of Monday of week minus 1 of the Michaelmas Term before the examination is held.

7. The course shall be assessed as follows:

(i) *Core Courses in Explanation and understanding in Criminology, and Understanding Criminal Justice*: There shall be a single three-hour examination covering both courses to be taken in week one of Trinity Term.

(ii) *Core courses in Research design and data analysis, and Social explanation and data analysis*: For each course there shall be one written assignment of 2,500–3,000 words to be submitted by 12 noon on Friday of 9th week of Michaelmas term (Research design) and Hilary term (Social explanation).

(iii) *Core course in Statistical methods in the social sciences*: There shall be an open-book class test to be held in the 0th week of Hilary term, and a take-home data analysis test that must be submitted by Friday of the 5th week of Hilary term.

(iv) *Core course in Qualitative research methods*: There shall be a two-part practical exercise. Part 1 is to be submitted by Friday of 8th week of Hilary term, and Part 2 by Friday of 0th week of Trinity term.

(v) *Options*: Each option shall be examined by means of an assessed essay of no less than 3,500 and no more than 5,000 words (inclusive of footnotes, but excluding bibliography and appendices), for which time will be set aside during the last three weeks of Trinity Term. A selection of three titles (as determined by the Board of Examiners), shall be posted on the designated noticeboard at the Centre for Criminology by noon on the Friday of week six of Trinity Term. Essays should be submitted not later than three weeks after this date, by noon.

Candidates shall be required to submit two typewritten copies of each coursework assignment detailed in (ii) to (v) above to the Clerk of the Schools, Examination Schools, High Street, Oxford on the dates and times specified.

(vi) *Dissertation*: Two typewritten copies of the dissertation shall be submitted to the Clerk of the Schools by noon on the weekday on or nearest to 14th September in the year in which the examination is taken. One bound copy of the dissertation of each candidate who passes the examination shall be deposited in the Social Science Library, Manor Road.

8. The degree of M. Sc. shall be awarded to any candidate who achieves a mark of at least 50 per cent in all four components of the course, namely the Explanation and understanding in criminology/Understanding criminal justice courses, the research methods courses, the options, and the dissertation.

9. The examiners may award a distinction for excellence in the whole examination.

10. Arrangements for reassessment shall be as follows:

(i) *Core Courses in Explanation and understanding in Criminology, and Understanding Criminal Justice*: Candidates who fail the joint examination may resit the examination in the Trinity Term of the following academic year. Such candidates who have completed successfully all or part of any of the other three components may carry forward the marks gained for the successfully completed parts of the degree.

(ii) *Research methods course*: Candidates who fail to obtain an aggregate average mark of 50 per cent for their assessed assignments in Michaelmas and Hilary Terms may resubmit those assignments in which they have received a mark of 49 per cent or less to the Clerk of the Schools, Examination Schools, High Street, Oxford according to the standard timetable for submitting essays in the following academic year. Candidates who have obtained a mark of 49 per cent or less for the take home test may resit the test at the first available opportunity provided by the standard resit timetable. Candidates who have completed successfully all or part of any of the other three components of the degree may carry forward the marks gained for the successfully completed components.

(iii) *Options*: candidates who have failed to obtain an aggregate average mark of 50 per cent for their assessed essays in Trinity Term may resubmit those essays in which they

have received a mark of 49 per cent or less to the Clerk of the Schools, Examination Schools, High Street, Oxford according to the standard timetable for submitting essays in the following academic year. Candidates who have completed successfully all or part of any of the other three components of the degree may carry forward the marks gained for the successfully completed components.

(iv) *Dissertation*: Candidates who fail the dissertation may resubmit the dissertation by the required date in the following academic year. Candidates who have completed successfully all or part of any of the other three components of the degree may carry forward the marks gained for the successfully completed components.

For successful completion of this course of practical work each candidate must have successfully completed each assignment set. The combined set of completed assignments forms the practical research methods workbook. Candidates shall submit this workbook to the Director of Graduate Studies in the Department of Social Policy and Social Work by noon on Friday of the sixth week of the third term of the course, accompanied by a statement that it is the candidate’s own work except where otherwise indicated. The Director of Graduate Studies, or a deputy, shall draw to the attention of the examiners the names of any candidates who have failed to complete to a satisfactory level of quality the course of practical work, and the examiners may require such candidates to retake the course or a specified part thereof. The practical workbooks shall be available for inspection by the examiners.

(b) Candidates are required to produce an essay of up to 2,500 words evaluating the research design, methods of data collection and analysis, and any ethical or philosophical issues that arise in a specified research paper. The Director of Graduate Studies shall publish a list of research papers not later than noon on Monday of the first week of the second term; candidates will be required to select one from this list of papers as the subject for their essay. Candidates shall submit their essay to the Clerk of the Schools by 12 noon on Monday of the first week of the third term of the course, accompanied by a statement that it is the candidate’s own work except where otherwise indicated.’

'SPECIAL REGULATIONS FOR THE HONOUR SCHOOL OF CLASSICS AND ORIENTAL STUDIES

A

1. The Honour School of Classics and Oriental Studies shall be under the joint supervision of the Boards of the Faculties of Classics and of Oriental Studies, which shall appoint a standing joint committee to make, and to submit to the two boards, proposals for regulations concerning the examination.

2. No candidate shall be admitted to the examination in this School unless he or she has either passed or been exempted from the First Public Examination.

3. The Public Examiners in this School shall be such of the Public Examiners in the Honour Schools of Literae Humaniores and of Oriental Studies as may be required, together with any additional examiners who may be required who shall be nominated by the committee for the

nomination of Public Examiners in one or both of those Honour Schools as appropriate.

4. In the Class List issued by the examiners the Main Subject and Additional Language offered by each candidate shall be indicated.

B

Candidates must offer one Main Subject and one Additional Language, of which one must be Classics and the other a subject or language in Oriental Studies as specified below. In addition they may offer, but are not required to offer, a Special Thesis in Classics, or in Oriental Studies, or in a subject linking Classics and Oriental Studies, in accordance with the Regulation on Theses in the Regulations for the Honour School of Literae Humaniores, save that references there to the Honour School of Literae Humaniores shall be deemed to be references to the Honour School of Classics and Oriental Studies, the competent authority for dealing with proposals shall be the standing joint committee for Classics and Oriental Studies, and proposals should be submitted to the chairman of that committee. Candidates offering a Special Thesis may not also offer an additional optional special subject where that is allowed under the Regulations for Oriental Studies.

Classics may be offered either as a Main Subject or as an Additional Language, save that those who have satisfied the Moderators in Honour Moderations or the Preliminary Examination in Classics may not offer Classics as an Additional Language without permission from the standing joint committee for Classics and Oriental Studies; such permission must be sought if possible no later than the beginning of the term following that in which the candidate sat the First Public Examination, and in any case no later than noon on the Friday of the First Week of Michaelmas Term before the examination.

In Oriental Studies, the following may be offered either as a Main Subject or as an Additional Language: Arabic, Hebrew, Persian, Sanskrit, Turkish.

Egyptology and Ancient Near Eastern Studies may be offered only as a Main Subject.

The following may be offered only as an Additional Language: Akkadian, Aramaic and Syriac, Armenian, Coptic, Egyptology, Old Iranian, Pali.

All Subjects and Languages other than Classics will be examined in accordance with the Regulations for the Honour School of Oriental Studies.

The subjects available in Classics are listed below. Those offering Classics as their Main Subject must offer **five** of these, of which at least two (or, in the case of those offering (xxxvii), (xxxviii) Greek or Latin for Beginners, at least one) must be drawn from nos (i)–(xx), (xxviii), (xxix) and (xxxvi); those offering Classics as their Additional Language must offer **three**, of which at least one must be drawn from nos (i)–(xx), (xxviii), (xxix), (xxxvi), (xxxvii) and (xxxviii) [on which, see note (f) below].

NOTE: (a) Subjects in Greek and Latin Literature, nos (i)–(xiv): candidates offering more than one of these subjects must offer (i) or (ii), and may offer both.

NOTE: (b) Each of subjects (iii) (a) Historiography, (iii) (b) Lyric Poetry, (iii) (c) Comedy and (xiv) (b) Medieval and Renaissance Latin Hexameter Poetry (of which candidates may offer only one) will be examined by an extended essay of 5,000–6,000 words and a one-and-a-half hour paper, as specified in the Regulations for the Honour School of

Literae Humaniores. For each of the subjects in (iii), version (i) (as specified for the Honour School of Literae Humaniores) is the only version available to candidates who have satisfied the Moderators in Course IA, IB or IC of Honour Moderations in Classics or of the Preliminary Examination in Classics. **Candidates offering one of these subjects who are also offering a dissertation on a topic in their Oriental language should consult the chairman of the standing joint committee for Classics and Oriental Studies about the timing of submission of the dissertation.**

NOTE: (c) Subjects in Greek and Roman History, nos (xv)–(xxvii): candidates offering more than one of these subjects must offer at least one of (xv)–(xx); candidates offering more than three of these subjects must offer at least two of (xv)–(xx) and may not offer more than two of (xxi)–(xxvii). Candidates offering any of subjects (xv)–(xx) must also offer the associated translation paper(s) set in the Honour School of Literae Humaniores, though candidates without competence in the relevant language may apply for dispensation from this requirement by application to the chairman of the standing joint committee by noon on the Friday of the first week of Michaelmas Term before the examination, setting out the full range of their intended options and stating why they think it educationally desirable to offer them.

NOTE: (d) Subjects in Philology and Linguistics, nos (xxviii)–(xxxix): candidates may not offer more than two of these subjects.

NOTE: (e) Subjects in Greek and Roman Archaeology, nos (xxxii)–(xxxv): candidates may not offer more than two of these subjects.

NOTE: (f) Subject (xxxvii), (xxxviii), Greek or Latin for Beginners counts as *two* subjects. It may not be offered by candidates who have satisfied the Moderators in Course IA, IB or IC of Honour Moderations in Classics or of the Preliminary Examination in Classics. Candidates who offer Greek or Latin for Beginners must offer *either* both subjects in Greek *or* both subjects in Latin, and may not offer either subject in the same language as they offered in Course IIA or IIB of Honour Moderations or the Preliminary Examination in Classics, if they sat either of those examinations.

NOTE: (g) It cannot be guaranteed that university lectures or classes or college teaching will be available on all subjects in every academic year. Candidates are advised to consult their tutors about the availability of teaching when selecting their subjects.

'1. *Admission/First year course work*

In History (which includes medieval history, economic and social history, history of science, and history of art) graduate students are initially admitted *either* as candidates for a taught course *or* as candidates for a research programme. The requirements for all taught courses are laid out in detail under their individual regulations above.

Candidates wishing to conduct research in the field of the *History of Art* may be required by the Faculty Board's Graduate Studies Committee to pass a Qualifying Examination before being admitted to the M.Litt. or D. Phil. programme, in which case the course of study for the Examination will be that set for the M.St. in the History of Art and Visual Culture, and will be examined by the examiners for that M.St. at the end of each Trinity Term.

Unless they have elected to enter for examination in the M.St. in Historical Research, or the M.St. in Historical Research (Medieval History), research students in their probationary period are required to undertake the work laid down below. Each candidate must normally:

(a) attend such lectures, seminars and classes as his or her supervisor shall determine; and

(b) present one seminar paper during the course. Such paper shall normally be assessed by two assessors. Such assessors should not include the candidate's supervisor. The work done for the seminar paper may form the basis of the essay required under (2) below.

(i) Applications for admission/transfer to M.Litt. or D. Phil. status shall be accompanied (or, in the case of candidates for the M.St. in Historical Research and the M.St. in Historical Research (Medieval History), followed at the appropriate date) by:

(1) two copies of a statement (of 500 to 1,000 words) of the subject of the thesis and the manner in which the candi-

date proposes to treat it; such a statement will also normally include a descriptive title for the research project, an indication of identified or envisaged primary sources, an outline of the time table for background reading, archival or field work, and writing-up; also an account of how the research project relates to work done for any relevant master's dissertation;

(2) two copies of a piece of written work, normally 3,000–5,000 words long (up to 10,000 words in the case of candidates for the M.St. in Historical Research, or up to 15,000 words in the case of candidates for the M.St. in Historical Research (Medieval History)), being *either* (a) a section of the proposed thesis, or (b) an essay on a relevant topic, or (except in the case of candidates for the M.St. in Historical Research and the M.St. in Historical Research (Medieval History)) (c) an augmented version of the statement required under (1) above; candidates should note that if they adopt alternative (c) they must also submit separately the statement required under (1) above;

(3) two copies of a confidential report from the supervisor, which should be sent by the supervisor directly to the Faculty's Graduate Office.

Successful completion of *either* the work prescribed above or of the M.St. in Historical Research or the M.St. in Historical Research (Medieval History) is not in itself sufficient qualification for students to advance to M.Litt. or D.Phil. status.

(ii) Candidates for the M.St. in Historical Research or the M.St. in Historical Research (Medieval History) who were unsuccessful in the examination, and whose application for transfer to M.Litt. or D.Phil. status was also unsuccessful, will be deemed to have transferred from research to taught course status. They will be permitted to re-enter the M.St. examination on one occasion only.

2. Readmission after completion of a taught course

Students who are currently entered as candidates for the examination in the M.St. in History, M.Phil. in Modern European History, M.Sc. in English Local History, M.Sc. or M.Phil. in Economic and Social History, M.Sc. or M.Phil. in History of Science, Medicine, and Technology, M.Sc. in History of Science: Instruments, Museums, Science, Technology, M.St. or M.Phil. in Byzantine Studies, or another relevant Master's course may apply for admission to the M.Litt. or D.Phil. programme in the year in which they enter the final examination for their M.Sc., M.St., or M.Phil. programme. Readmission may be made conditional on such requirements as the Graduate Studies Committee may impose, and successful completion of their current degree is not in itself sufficient qualification for students to be admitted to a research programme.

3. Transfer to full M.Litt. or D.Phil. status

(i) The application form, endorsed by the candidate's society and supervisor, and the supporting material as outlined under 1. (i) above shall normally be presented to the Faculty's Graduate Office not later than Friday of Eighth Week in the candidate's first Hilary Term. In exceptional cases the Graduate Studies Committee may permit the candidate to postpone submission: candidates seeking such postponement should apply to the Director of Graduate Studies well in advance.

(ii) Two copies of a confidential report from the supervisor should be sent by the supervisor directly to the Faculty's Graduate Office. The Graduate Office shall send both

copies of the written work and the confidential report to the candidate's interviewer who will pass on one copy to the second assessor nominated as below.

(iii) The interviewer shall then, together with a second assessor appointed in conjunction with the Director of Graduate Studies, examine the candidate orally. The interviewer shall be entitled after consultation with the Director of Graduate Studies to appoint a deputy to act instead. When the interviewer is also the supervisor, the Director of Graduate Studies shall act as if he or she were the interviewer and shall have power to appoint a deputy and the second assessor.

For candidates for the M.St. in Historical Research the viva voce examination may incorporate the Transfer of Status interview, if appropriate. In these cases interviewers and second assessors are appointed by the Examiners. Candidates for the M.St. in Historical Research (Medieval History) shall submit their appropriately endorsed application form by Monday of Third Week of the Michaelmas Term following their examination, together with the statement outlined in 1. (i) (1) above.

(iv) The assessors shall report to the Graduate Studies Committee in writing whether the candidate's subject is satisfactory for the degree in question and whether he or she is competent to tackle it.¹ If they think this is not the case, they may recommend resubmission after a set period of further probation; such resubmission will constitute the second attempt at Transfer of Status provided for in the General Regulations for the degree. If the assessors disagree, the Graduate Studies Committee shall decide what should be done.

(v) Candidates holding the status of M.Litt. student may apply for transfer to D. Phil. status at any time, within the statutory limit of nine terms. Their Transfer of Status application will be considered according to the procedure laid down for confirmation of D. Phil. status (see below). The interviewer appointed by the Faculty Board shall follow that procedure, except that the interviewer will be asked to state explicitly whether in addition to this procedure a subsequent formal confirmation of D. Phil. status would be desirable, or not.

4. Confirmation of D.Phil. status

(i) Application for confirmation of D. Phil. status, with endorsements by the candidate's society and supervisor, shall normally be presented to the Faculty's Graduate Office not later than Monday of Third Week in the eighth term after admission to the D. Phil. programme. In exceptional cases the Graduate Studies Committee may permit

Phil. status shall be accompanied by: (1) a statement (of 500 to 1,000 words) of the subject of the thesis and the manner in which the candidate proposes to treat it, including a draft chapter plan, and a time table for the completion of work remaining and for the submission of the thesis; (2) a specimen chapter or part of a chapter not longer than 6,000 words; (3) a confidential report from the supervisor which should be sent direct to the Faculty's Graduate Office. The Graduate Office should send the written work and the confidential report to the interviewer appointed by the Faculty Board.

(iii) The interviewer shall then examine the candidate orally. If the interviewer considers it necessary, a second assessor may be appointed in conjunction with the Director of Graduate Studies. In cases where the interviewer is also the supervisor, the Director of Graduate Studies shall act as if he or she were the interviewer and shall have power to appoint a deputy and, if necessary, a second assessor.

(iv) The interviewer shall report to the Graduate Studies Committee in writing whether the candidate's subject is satisfactory and whether he or she is competent to tackle it. If confirmation is not recommended the interviewer may recommend reapplication after a further period of study (within the timeframe provided for in the General Regulations) or alternatively transfer to M.Litt. status, subject to the general regulations governing confirmation of status.

5. Theses

Theses submitted for the Degree of M.Litt. should not exceed 50,000 words and those submitted for the Degree of D.Phil. should not exceed 100,000 words, *including* all notes, appendices, any source material being edited, and all other parts of the thesis whatsoever, *excluding* only the bibliography; any thesis exceeding these limits is liable to be rejected on that ground. Any application for permission to exceed the limit should be submitted with a detailed explanation and statement of the amount of excess length requested, and with a covering letter from the supervisor. Applications should be made as soon as possible and may not be made later than the last day of the fifth week of the term before that in which application is made for appointment of examiners. The presentation and footnotes should comply with the requirements specified in the Regulations of the General Board for the degrees of M.Litt. and D. Phil. and follow the *Conventions for the presentation of essays, dissertations and theses* of the Faculty of History.

All candidates must submit with their thesis two printed or typewritten copies of an abstract of the thesis, which shall not normally exceed 1,500 words for the M.Litt. or 2,500 words for the D. Phil., prepared by the student. This is in addition to the requirement to submit an abstract of not more than 300 words in length required by the General Board's regulations. Copies of both abstracts shall be bound into the copy of the thesis which shall be deposited in the Bodleian Library. One loose copy of the 300 words abstract, printed on a single page, must be submitted together with the Library copy to the Graduate Studies Office.

(iv) The Board may indicate a provisional readiness to admit to M.Litt. or D. Phil. Student status, which will then be subject to a report from the Examiners of the M.St. or M.Phil.

(v) Admission will be conditional upon a Qualifying Test in a language other than English relevant to the proposed research. The Board may dispense an applicant from this Test if other sufficient proof of linguistic competence is offered. Normally no applicant will be required as a condition of admission to M.Litt. or D. Phil. status to demonstrate competence in more than one language other than English; but if the proposed research requires further linguistic competence, the Board may set a further date by which such competence shall be demonstrated.

2. *Admission by the route of Probationer Research Student*

(i) Admission to the status of Probationer Research Student will normally be granted only to applicants who have already completed a Master's level graduate degree, including a dissertation or thesis, in a theological subject.

(ii) Application for admission as a Probationer Research Student, which shall be made at the times and in the manner announced for graduate admissions applications, will normally be accompanied by an interview with a member of the Graduate Studies Committee, though the Board may dispense from this.

(iii) A Probationer Research Student is normally expected to apply for transfer within three terms (or six terms in the case of part-time students). A Probationer Research Student who has not successfully transferred by the end of the six terms for which such status may be held in total (twelve terms in the case of part-time students) shall lapse from the register of Graduate Students.

(iv) The application for transfer must include two typewritten copies of a description in about 500 words of the research which it is intended to undertake and two typewritten copies of a piece of original written work of about 5,000 words relevant to the subject of the proposed research.

(v) There shall be an oral examination with a competent person appointed by the Board as assessor, which may treat of the description of the proposed research, the submitted piece of work and any other aspect of the applicant's progress towards research. The candidate's supervisor may attend this examination. If the candidate fails to satisfy the assessor, the Board may appoint a date by which a further oral examination must be held, with such conditions as it sees fit, and grant extension of Probationer Research Student status up to that date, subject to the overall limit in 1(iii) above.

(vi) Admission to M.Litt. or D. Phil. student status shall be conditional upon a Qualifying Test in a language other than English relevant to the proposed research. The Board may dispense an applicant from this Test if other sufficient proof of linguistic competence is offered. Normally no applicant will be required as a condition of admission to M.Litt. or D. Phil. status to demonstrate competence in more than one language other than English; but if the proposed research requires further linguistic competence, the Board may set a further date by which such competence shall be demonstrated.

Titles for the various pieces of work should not substantially overlap with each other, though they may cover ground included in the scope of examinations as detailed below. The titles should all fall within one of the six subject areas listed below, and, in the case of Christian Doctrine and Ecclesiastical History, within the same section.

5. Two copies of essays must be submitted not later than noon on Friday of week 5 of Trinity Term. Two copies of the dissertation must be submitted at least twenty-eight days before the first day of Michaelmas Full Term following the

examination. All submitted work must be printed and sent in a parcel bearing the words 'M.St. in Theology' to The Chairman of Examiners, c/o the Clerk to the Schools, Examination Schools, High Street, Oxford.

6. Syllabus:

The subject areas within which work may be submitted are: Old Testament, New Testament, Christian Doctrine, Ecclesiastical History, Christian Ethics and Science and Religion.

REGULATIONS SPECIFIC TO SUBJECT AREAS

I. *Old Testament*

Candidates shall take an examination on portions from the Old Testament in Hebrew. The texts prescribed will be published by the Board of the Faculty of Theology before the end of Michaelmas Term.

II. *New Testament*

Candidates may take an examination on portions from the New Testament in Greek. The texts prescribed will be published by the Board of the Faculty of Theology before the end of Michaelmas Term.

III. *Ecclesiastical History*

(a) Work submitted in this subject area shall lie within one of the following sections:

1. The Early Church AD 200–476

2. The Western Church AD 476–1050

3. The Western Church AD 1050–1400

4. English Church History AD 1066–1272

5. European Christianity AD 1400–1800

6. European Christianity AD 1800–2000

(b) Candidates shall take an examination in The Nature and Practice of Ecclesiastical History.

IV. *Christian Doctrine*

(a) Work submitted in this subject area shall lie within one of the following sections:

(1) History of Doctrine: Patristic Theology

(2) History of Doctrine: Scholastic Theology

(3) History of Doctrine: Theology of the Reformation Period

(4). *Modern Doctrine*

(b) Candidates in sections (1) to (3) shall take an examination on theological texts in the original languages. The texts prescribed for each section will be published by the Board of the Faculty of Theology before the end of Michaelmas Term. Candidates will not be required to show knowledge of texts in more than one original language other than English.

(c) Candidates in section (4) shall take an examination in Methods and Styles of Theology. In proposing titles for essays and dissertation, candidates in section (4) should explain in which pieces of work they will demonstrate competence in (i) exploring the encounter between theology and some non-theological discipline; (ii) exploring a modern theological response to some theological reflection of the past.

V. *Christian Ethics*

In proposing titles for essays and dissertation, candidates should explain in which pieces of work they will demonstrate competence in (i) exploring an ethical question, substantive or conceptual, in relation to contemporary discussion; (ii) the interpretation of a Biblical text of

moral significance; (iii) the discussion of a non-Biblical text of moral significance from some period of history prior to 1900.

VI. *Science and Religion*

Candidates may take a general examination on Science and Religion.

In proposing titles for essays and dissertation, candidates should explain in which pieces of work they will demonstrate competence in (i) exploring a historical debate in which scientific and religious issues are involved; (ii) exploring a philosophical debate with a bearing on the discussion of science and religion; (iii) analysing a contemporary issue on the interface between science and religion.'
