University and College Fees to be combined from next year

If you're an international undergraduate, the way your fees are charged and presented will change from the next academic year. Until this year, international undergraduates (as well as all graduate students) have been charged separate 'University' and 'College' fees. From the 2019/20 academic year, these figures will be combined into a single figure, known as 'Course Fees'. The total amount you pay will not change (apart from inflation), and the change will make it easier to see the overall level of fees you will be paying. HackZurich 2019 – Europe's biggest Hackathon

HackZurich is the sixth edition of Europe's biggest hackathon. 550 top engineering students, selected from a global pool of 5,000+ student applications from more than 55 countries, are invited to Zurich to hack on web, mobile, and hardware for a 40-hour competition in teams of 2 to 4 people. International companies will provide hardware and programming frameworks to spark the creation of new applications in several categories. Research highlight: Site of biggest ever meteorite collision in the UK discovered

Scientists believe they have discovered the site of the biggest meteorite impact ever to hit the British Isles. Evidence for the ancient, 1.2 billion years old, meteorite strike, was first discovered in 2008 near Ullapool, NW Scotland by scientists from Oxford and Aberdeen Universities. The thickness and extent of the debris deposit they found suggested the impact crater – made by a meteorite estimated at 1km wide – was close to the coast, but its precise location remained a mystery.
