Course Information Sheet for entry in 2019~20

Undergraduate Certificate in the History of Art

About the course

This two-year, part-time course in the History of Art is equivalent to the first year of an undergraduate degree. It offers a broad framework and acts as an introductory course for students who wish to develop their knowledge of the subject by structured study.

In the first year, you will gain an understanding of visual analysis, techniques, methods of art criticism, and the necessary terms that will underpin all further study. Tutors will lead visits to museums and art galleries and, wherever possible, visits will be made to current exhibitions. Oxford itself is very rich in its museums and buildings and every opportunity will be taken to introduce these to you.

The second year is more chronologically focused, allowing you to apply the skills you have learnt in the first year to a sustained examination of the major developments within Western art across the last millennium. Both well and lesser-known artists from the Medieval, Renaissance of Modern periods will be examined alongside major themes. Each module will move across mediums, to include painting, sculpture and architecture, as well as more period-specific media, such as manuscript illumination, printing and land art.

Each year has three terms of weekly classes. The sessions will be lively, structured and informative with plenty of time for discussion. Each class will be illustrated with slides and, occasionally, with video material.

Assessment

- For Year 1, you must complete five assignments of not more than 1,500 words and one 3,000 word project.
- For Year 2, you must complete three assignments of not more than 2,000 words and one 5,000 word project.

In Year One each of the five assignments counts for 12%; the research project counts for 40%. In Year Two each of the three assignments counts for 20%; the research project counts for 40%. Both years contribute equally to the final mark.

Candidates are also expected to complete slide tests. These are formative only and do not contribute to the final mark. There is no formal examination at the end of the Certificate course.

Attendance

Candidates are expected to attend a minimum of:

- 75% of the taught classes per module, and
- Three study visits per module.

Changes to courses

The University will seek to deliver each course in accordance with the descriptions set out above. Some books will be recommended for you to purchase but recommendations will be made with costs in mind.
