Course Information Sheet for entry in 2018-19 MSc in Education (Child Development and Education)



About the course

The MSc Education (Child Development and Education) is unique in offering a combination of a strong research basis with recognised expertise in applied research and policy. It aims to promote critical understanding of developmental theories and research and the use of this knowledge in the design and evaluation of programmes aimed at promoting children's development and education.

The course aims to promote reflection and discussion about how theories of child development inform practice and how challenges faced in educational and care settings call for further enquiry.

In this full-time, one year master's course, you will participate in lectures, seminars, workshops and field work for your master's dissertation, all of which provide rich opportunities for you to deepen your understanding of child development theories and their use in making decisions about children.

The teaching style adopted is usually a combination of tutor and student input, and is reliant on students' reading of key texts, preparation of arguments, responses to a presentation analysis of documents and various group activities and students' presentations. In addition to four pathway-specific core papers, two core papers in research methods develop students' understanding in key concepts and principles of educational research design and methodology, using both quantitative and qualitative methods and data. Students benefit from the expertise available through the Qualitative Methods Hub and the Quantitative Methods Hub at the Department of Education.

In addition, an optional practicum about assessments and programmes related to children's literacy in pre- and primary school is offered. In discussions with your supervisor you will choose a topic for your master's project.

The course is examined through six written assignments and a research dissertation.
