# Course Information Sheet for entry in 2026-27: MSc by Research in Psychiatry

## About the course

The MSc by Research in Psychiatry offers the opportunity to gain transferrable research skills alongside knowledge and expertise in one of a range of research fields from molecular biology to brain imaging and behavioural research to epidemiology.

The MSc by Research in Psychiatry is designed to allow you to develop the skills required to become an independent researcher, as well as acquiring expertise within a particular research area.

Working on a project of your own under the guidance of a supervisor provides you with a primary learning experience. You are encouraged to take advantage of the comprehensive, flexible training programme offered by the Medical Sciences Graduate School which includes general and specific research skills and more advanced academic courses.

You may also be required to undertake one or more training courses related to your area of research, ie statistics training. In addition to this, the department organises opportunities for students to meet together and to present their research to their peers, enabling you to benefit from feedback and to begin networking with students in other research areas.

#### **Attendance**

The course can be studied full-time or part-time with both modes requiring attendance in Oxford. Full-time students are subject to the <u>University's Residence requirements</u>. (//www.ox.ac.uk/admissions/graduate/after-you-apply/accommodation/residence-requirements) Part-time students are required to attend course-related activities in Oxford for a minimum of 30 days each year.

The full-time course is studied over one to three years. The part-time course has the same requirements, but is studied over two to six years.

As a part-time student you will be required to attend seminars/supervision meetings/research meetings and other obligations in Oxford as much as possible. There will be limited flexibility in the dates and pattern of attendance, which will be determined by mutual agreement with your supervisor. Attendance will be required during both term-time and outside of term-time as mutually agreed with your supervisor. You will have the opportunity to tailor your part-time study / skills training in liaison with your supervisor and agree your pattern of attendance.

## Resources to support your study

As a graduate student, you will have access to the University's wide range of resources including libraries, museums, galleries, digital resources and IT services.

The Bodleian Libraries is the largest library system in the UK. It includes the main Bodleian Library and libraries across Oxford, including major research libraries and faculty, department and institute libraries. Together, the Libraries hold more than 13 million printed items, provide access to e-journals, and contain outstanding special collections including rare books and manuscripts, classical papyri, maps, music, art and printed ephemera.

The University's IT Services is available to all students to support with core university IT systems and tools, as well as many other services and facilities. IT Services also offers a range of IT learning courses for students to support with learning and research, as well as guidance on what technology to bring with you as a new student (https://www.it.ox.ac.uk/what-to-bring) at Oxford.

There is a common room in the department with a small kitchen where students and staff can have lunch and hold informal meetings. There are also a number of conference rooms and a seminar room equipped AV equipment and internet access for presentations, Teams calls etc.

The department has links with the <u>Cairns Library (https://www.accessguide.ox.ac.uk/cairns-library)</u> at the John Radcliffe Hospital whose staff provide an introduction and some further training sessions for all members of the department during the

academic year. The librarians are able to give individual help. You will need to register with the Cairns Library (laboratories, testing rooms and scanning facilities).

## Supervision

The allocation of graduate supervision for this course is the responsibility of the Department of Psychiatry and it is not always possible to accommodate the preferences of incoming graduate students to work with a particular member of staff. Under exceptional circumstances a supervisor may be found outside the Department of Psychiatry.

You will have a supervisor from within the department and may have a co-supervisor/advisor from within the department or from elsewhere, such as the Departments of Experimental Psychology, Clinical Neuroscience and Pharmacology and/or the Centre for Functional Magnetic Resonance Imaging of the Brain (fMRIB).

You will have the opportunity to meet individually with your supervisor(s) at mutually agreed times, typically once a fortnight, and whenever necessary as agreed between you and the supervisor(s).

In addition to academic supervision, the graduate studies team within the department provide support and advice to students at all stages of their study. This includes holding meetings to provide a forum for students to discuss their research and identify those working in related areas with whom they can share ideas.

#### **Assessment**

Examination of an MSc by Research involves submission of a thesis which is examined by viva. Prior to this, you must transfer your status from probationary student to MSc by Research student. This involves making a brief presentation to assessors outlining your work and a timetable for completion of the thesis. This process needs to be completed after two terms of study for full-time students and four terms for part-time students.

#### Research areas

You'll have the opportunity to undertake research within the specialised themes of this course, which include:

- neurobiology
- · psychological treatments
- · developmental psychiatry
- social psychiatry.

# Changes to this course

The University will seek to deliver this course in accordance with the description set out in this course page. #### What do course fees cover?

Course fees cover your teaching as well as other academic services and facilities provided to support your studies. Unless specified in the additional information section below, course fees do not cover your accommodation, residential costs or other living costs. They also don't cover any additional costs and charges that are outlined in the additional costs information below.

## How long do I need to pay course fees?

Course fees are payable each year, for the duration of your fee liability (your fee liability is the length of time for which you are required to pay course fees). For courses lasting longer than one year fees will usually increase annually, as explained in the University's <u>Terms and Conditions (//www.ox.ac.uk/students/new/contract)</u>.

Graduate students who have reached the end of their standard period of fee liability will be required to pay a University continuation charge and/or a college continuation charge.

The University continuation charge, per term for entry in 2026-27 is £656, please be aware that this will increase annually. For part-time students, the termly charge will be half of the termly rate payable by full-time students.

If a college continuation charge applies (not applicable for non-matriculated courses) it will be between £150 and £500, as explained in our <u>information about continuation charges (//www.ox.ac.uk/admissions/graduate/fees-and-funding/fees-and-other-charges/continuation-charges)</u>. Please contact your college for more details, including information about whether your college's continuation charge is applied at a different rate for part-time study.

#### **Additional costs**

## **Full-time study**

There are no compulsory elements of this course that entail additional costs to the student beyond fees (or, after fee liability ends, continuation charges) and living costs.

## Part-time study

There are other compulsory elements of this course that entail additional costs to the student beyond fees (or, after fee liability ends, continuation charges) and living costs. Please note that you are required to attend in Oxford for a minimum of 30 days each year, and you may incur additional travel and accommodation expenses for this.

## Living costs

In addition to your course fees and any additional course-specific costs, you will need to ensure that you have adequate funds to support your living costs for the duration of your course.

## Living costs for full-time study

For the 2026-27 academic year, the range of likely living costs for a single, full-time student is between £1,405 and £2,105 for each month spent in Oxford. We provide the cost per month so you can multiply up by the number of months you expect to live in Oxford. Depending on your circumstances, you may also need to budget for the costs of a student visa and immigration health surcharge (//www.ox.ac.uk/admissions/graduate/fees-and-funding/living-costs) and/or living costs for family members or other dependants (//www.ox.ac.uk/admissions/graduate/fees-and-funding/living-costs#field listing content content-item--2) that you plan to bring with you to Oxford (if dependant visa eligibility criteria (//www.ox.ac.uk/students/visa/before/family) are met).

## Living costs for part-time study

Your living costs may vary depending on your personal circumstances but you will still need to cover your cost of living on a full-time basis for the duration of your course, even if you will not be based in Oxford throughout your studies. While the range of likely living costs for a single, full-time student living in Oxford in the 2026-27 academic year is between £1,405 and £2,105 per month, living costs outside Oxford may be different.

Part-time students who are not based in Oxford will need to calculate travel and accommodation costs carefully. Depending on your circumstances and study plans, this may include the <u>cost of a visitor visa to attend for short blocks of time (//www.ox.ac.uk/admissions/graduate/fees-and-funding/living-costs)</u> (if <u>visitor visa eligibility criteria (//www.ox.ac.uk/students/visa/before/visitors)</u> are met).

#### Further information about living costs

The current economic climate and periods of high national inflation in recent years make it harder to estimate potential changes to the cost of living over the next few years. For study in Oxford beyond the 2026-27 academic year, it is suggested that you budget for potential increases in living expenses of around 4% each year – although this rate may vary depending on the national economic situation.

A breakdown of likely living costs for one month during the 2026-27 academic year are shown below. These costs are based on a single, full-time graduate student, with no dependants, living in Oxford.
