

## Course Information Sheet for entry in 2026-27: MSc in Education (Comparative and International Education)

### About the course

The MSc Education (Comparative and International Education) will help you develop a critical understanding of the multidisciplinary field of comparative and international education.

Throughout the course you will engage with diverse perspectives around theoretical and conceptual approaches, research methods, policies and practices in comparative and international education. The course also encourages a holistic view of researching issues of educational importance through an engagement with scholarship that encourages diverse perspectives.

The course focuses on developing a broad and critical understanding of the field researching issues related with education in a global world. In this way it will prepare you to understand and locate your research interests in the field of comparative and international education, and develop your ability to apply a critical approach to understanding issues of educational importance.

### Course structure

An overview of the course structure is provided below. Details of the compulsory and optional elements of the course are provided in the *Course components* section of this page.

In the first term you will take three core modules and in the second term you will take two further core modules. You will also choose one assessed option paper from a selection offered by academic staff across the department.

The MSc Education (Comparative and International Education) offers seminar style sessions which are highly interactive, student led, and student-centred with a balanced orientation towards theory and practice. One of the pedagogic objectives of the programme is to develop independent thinking skills and to proactively take responsibility for learning. The seminar structures will vary depending on the requirements of the sessions and tutor approaches.

The papers offered for the programme generally benefit from the international, educational, scholarly and lived experiences of the cohort. You will be encouraged to engage with the academic community at the departmental level.

### Attendance

The course is full-time and requires attendance in Oxford. ### Resources to support your study

As a graduate student, you will have access to the University's wide range of resources including libraries, museums, galleries, digital resources and IT services.

The Bodleian Libraries is the largest library system in the UK. It includes the main Bodleian Library and libraries across Oxford, including major research libraries and faculty, department and institute libraries. Together, the Libraries hold more than 13 million printed items, provide access to e-journals, and contain outstanding special collections including rare books and manuscripts, classical papyri, maps, music, art and printed ephemera.

The University's IT Services is available to all students to support with core university IT systems and tools, as well as many other services and facilities. IT Services also offers a range of IT learning courses for students to support with learning and research, as well as [guidance on what technology to bring with you as a new student](https://www.it.ox.ac.uk/what-to-bring) (<https://www.it.ox.ac.uk/what-to-bring>) at Oxford.

The Bodleian Education Library, located at the centre of the Department of Education, specialises in material on education and related fields. As well as a print collection of books, journals and statistics, the library provides access to a wide range of electronic resources. The library also houses a collection of teaching resources, primarily in support of subjects covered by the department's secondary PGCE course. The Social Sciences Library provides valuable additional resource to students pursuing programmes in the Department of Education.

## Supervision

The allocation of graduate supervision for this course is the responsibility of the Department of Education. This will be done on the basis of the topic of research and the availability of individual supervisors. It is not always possible to accommodate the preferences of incoming graduate students to work with a particular member of staff. Under exceptional circumstances a supervisor may be found outside the Department of Education.

Most students have the opportunity to receive around 10 hours of supervision over the course of the academic year.

## Assessment

You will complete six modules, currently each module is assessed by coursework, usually in the form of submitted essays, and a dissertation on a topic chosen in discussions with your supervisor.

The Department of Education will undertake a comprehensive review of its assessment methods during the 2025–26 academic year, taking into account recent developments in Artificial Intelligence. As a result, some assessment methods may be subject to change. Applicants and offer-holders will be informed of the revised approach to assessment prior to starting the course.

## Course components

### Compulsory study

In the first term you will take the following three core modules:

- Comparative and International Education: An Overview of the Field: This module explores international education systems, examining how social, political, and cultural factors shape learning. Students engage with key theories and debates to address issues of equity, quality, and change.
- Researching with the South: Decolonizing Communication Practices in Education Research: This module examines ethical and reflexive research across the North–South divide, challenging dominant narratives and encouraging critical engagement with Southern knowledge systems and power in global educational research.
- Foundations of Educational Research 1: Concepts and Design.

In the second term you will take two further core modules:

- The Implementation of the Rights of Children: This course explores how to assess and improve policy implementation in children's rights, using evidence and case studies to evaluate goal achievement and government accountability in specific national contexts.
- Foundations of Educational Research 2: Strategies and Methods.

### Options

You will also choose one assessed option paper from a selection offered by academic staff across the department. The following list provides an indication of modules available in the previous years:

- Core Principles of Child Assessment
- Critical Digital Innovation
- Education in Africa
- Education, the Internet and Society
- Global Higher Education
- Intermediate Quantitative Research
- Qualitative Research.

## Changes to this course

The University will seek to deliver this course in accordance with the description set out in this course page. ### Additional costs

Please note that as part of your course requirements, you will need to choose a dissertation topic. This element of the course is mandatory and forms part of the assessment for the course. Depending on your choice of topic and the research required to complete it, you may incur additional expenses, such as travel expenses (transport, accommodation, meals), research expenses, equipment, materials and field trips. These costs will vary according to the location and length of the fieldwork. You will need to meet these additional costs yourself. There are no other compulsory elements of this course that entail additional costs beyond fees and living costs.

### Living costs

In addition to your course fees and any additional course-specific costs, you will need to ensure that you have adequate funds to support your living costs for the duration of your course.

### Living costs for full-time study

For the 2026-27 academic year, the range of likely living costs for a single, full-time student is between £1,405 and £2,105 for each month spent in Oxford. We provide the cost per month so you can multiply up by the number of months you expect to live in Oxford. ### Further information about living costs

The current economic climate and periods of high national inflation in recent years make it harder to estimate potential changes to the cost of living over the next few years. For study in Oxford beyond the 2026-27 academic year, it is suggested

that you budget for potential increases in living expenses of around 4% each year – although this rate may vary depending on the national economic situation.

A breakdown of likely living costs for one month during the 2026-27 academic year are shown below. These costs are based on a single, full-time graduate student, with no dependants, living in Oxford.
