PGDip in Diplomatic Studies

About the course

The Postgraduate Diploma (PGDip) in Diplomatic Studies is a progression course at the Department for Continuing Education and is only available if you have been admitted in the first instance to the Certificate in Diplomatic Studies.

Admission to the Postgraduate Diploma takes place at the end of the first term, on the basis of a transfer proposal and assessment of your first term's work.

The Postgraduate Diploma requires, in addition to the certificate course, the completion of a substantial research project of 12,000 words.

If you successfully complete the Postgraduate Diploma, you will be eligible to apply to undertake the part-time Master of Studies in Diplomatic Studies.

Content of the year and methods of study

The core curriculum focuses on the academic study of international politics, international trade and finance, and public international law, and a range of talks and practical exercises on aspects of current diplomatic practice. Emphasis is placed on national and regional issues relevant to countries and regions from which the participants come.

Instruction is carried out through lectures, seminars, classes and tutorials. Contact hours would typically amount to 64 lectures/seminars, 14 classes and 35 tutorials. Preparation for this is by self-directed work.

As part of the diplomatic practice element, study visits are made in the United Kingdom and elsewhere in Europe. Occasional guest speakers, guest dinners and simulation exercises are offered throughout the academic year. You are also encouraged to attend the numerous lectures, seminars and other events relevant to your interests held elsewhere in the University in addition to the obligatory Foreign Service Programme (FSP) curriculum.

More information on the ground covered by the curriculum included in a normal year's programme is given in the FSP Course Outline together with an outline programme.

Languages

The working language of the course is English. You will be accepted only if you can demonstrate that you possess the necessary English language skills.

One of the gains from membership of Oxford University Foreign Service Programme, even for those who come from English-speaking countries, is the opportunity it provides to build up and polish to a very high and sustained standard of effectiveness and fluency your command of the English language, the major international and diplomatic language in today's world. FSP therefore provides, as a central part of the course, advanced English language training alongside media techniques.



The resources of the University Language Centre are fully available to FSP members interested in learning or improving their knowledge of other languages.

Additional cost information

Please note that this course requires that you attend in Oxford for teaching, and you may incur additional travel and accommodation expenses for this. Further, as part of your course requirements, you may need to choose a dissertation, a project or a thesis topic. Depending on your choice of topic and the research required to complete it, you may incur additional expenses, such as travel expenses, research expenses, and field trips. You will need to meet these additional costs, although you may be able to apply for small grants from your department and/or college to help you cover some of these expenses.

Living costs

In addition to your fees, you will need to ensure that you have adequate funds to support your living costs for the duration of your course.
