**Candidates for Philosophy and Modern Languages will be required to sit a maximum of two tests, the Philosophy Test and a maximum of one language paper.

***Candidates for Classics and English who take the ELAT and both the Latin and Greek papers will be required to sit tests for a total of 3.5 hours. Exams Officers may wish to allow these candidates a supervised break in between the two tests.
