MSc in Global Healthcare Leadership

About the course

The MSc in Global Healthcare Leadership is designed to develop experienced leaders with the skills to deliver affordable, effective and efficient healthcare in complex global systems.

This multidisciplinary Master's degree is led by the Nuffield Department of Primary Care Health Sciences in partnership with Saïd Business School, creating an innovative and integrated programme that harnesses the University's world-leading expertise in healthcare, business and policy.

Taking a holistic approach and looking at healthcare from an individual, organisational and systemic perspective. This programme will help you develop resilience and the ability to innovate and strengthen healthcare provision.

Course outline:

Designed for experienced healthcare managers and leaders with over five years' relevant professional experience, this part-time programme awards a master's degree from the University of Oxford whilst allowing participants to study alongside full-time employment.

Intellectually rigorous and highly practical, the modular format consists of seven in-person courses taught in Oxford and one online course. This will be supported by online distance learning activities and reading.

You'll benefit from discussion and networking with an international group of world-class faculty, guest experts and peers, whilst receiving privileged access to different parts of Oxford University.

Teaching methods include lectures, practical sessions, small group workshops, one-to-one coaching, virtual learning and real-world case studies, and students are advised that approximately 10 hours of self-directed study per week outside of the modules is required.

Core modules:

- Healthcare leader: Personal perspectives and challenges
- Organisational leadership
- Systems leading in comparative health systems
- Leading with evidence-based healthcare
- Healthcare innovation
- Healthcare policy and systems
- Challenges in global health
- Evidence-based healthcare: Study design and research methods

Supervision

Every graduate student at Oxford has an academic supervisor, with whom they may discuss their academic progression, and who can provide support and advice in response to problems or concerns in relation to their learning.

The allocation of graduate supervision for this course is the responsibility of the Nuffield Department of Primary Care Health Sciences and the Saïd Business School and it is not always possible to accommodate the preferences of incoming graduate students to work with a particular member of staff. A supervisor may be found outside the Nuffield Department of Primary Care Health Sciences and/or the Saïd Business School, but would need to be approved by the programme. Students will generally meet with their academic supervisor once a term (approximately three times per year).

Assessment

The MSc Global Healthcare Leadership course assessment will either be conducted via submission, presentation or timed examination throughout the duration of the programme. The programme concludes with a written dissertation.

Changes to courses

The University will seek to deliver this course in accordance with the description set out above. Additional cost information

This course has residential sessions in Oxford. You will need to meet your travel and accommodation costs in attending these sessions. Further, as part of your course requirements, you may need to choose a dissertation, a project or a thesis topic. Depending on your choice of topic and the research required to complete it, you may incur additional expenses, such as travel expenses, research expenses, and field trips. You will need to meet these additional costs, although you may be able to apply for small grants from your department and/or college to help you cover some of these expenses.

Living costs

In addition to your course fees, you will need to ensure that you have adequate funds to support your living costs for the duration of your course.

If you are studying part-time your living costs may vary depending on your personal circumstances but you must still ensure that you will have sufficient funding to meet these costs for the duration of your course.
